Keynote Presentations

Monday, May 17

Abusive Head Trauma:

This session will provide an update on abusive head trauma focusing on diagnosis and current legal controversies. Presenter: Robert Block, MD

Cases: This session addresses the best ways to prove an abusive head trauma case in court using computer graphics and animations to prove critical points, effective investigation techniques that yield a better case for court and explains why prosecutors should resist attempts by the defense to turn a case into a battle of experts over the validity of any particular mechanism of iniury.

Case Scenario: Abusive Head Trauma: The panel will review two case scenarios to help the audience understand how interdisciplinary collaboration helps develop an evidence based diagnosis, treatment and prosecution approach to suspected abusive head injury cases.

Tuesday, May 18

Early Brain Development, Environment and Trauma: This session will address how early relational traumas compromise early normative brain development in ways that leave children vulnerable to developmental difficulties and how community support can provide needed protection even when early traumas cause children to become vulnerable. Presenter: Anne Gearity, PhD, LICSW

Children Exposed to Violence: How do their Experiences Impact Investigation and Treatment: This session addresses the necessary considerations of interviewing children who may have witnessed a traumatic event, provides information critical to understanding how children report about violence and guides professionals on how to elicit critical information from children while supporting their emotional needs. Presenter: Amy Russell, JD

Environmental Influences on Sexual Abuse, Exploitation and Harm: This session defines normalization of sexual harm, provides multiple examples of the problem and its impact and will offer new ways to think about what can be done to prevent the harm. Presenter: Cordelia Anderson, MA

Wednesday, May 19

Table Talk: A Conversation About the Future of Child Advocacy Centers and the Child Protection Movement as a Whole: This session reviews the history of children's advocacy centers and the research supporting the development of a multi-disciplinary response to allegations of child abuse. Recommendations to support CACs and MDTs in responding to emerging challenges will be offered. Presenter: Victor Vieth, JD

Vicarious Trauma and Child Abuse Professionals: This session will address the effects of working with and responding to children who have witnessed and experienced violence and people whose loved ones have been violated in the most intimate ways, as well as methods to reduce the risks of vicarious trauma and burnout. Presenter: Amy Russell, JD

Peyton's Story: The Passage of the Child Witness Protection Act: Told through the eyes of her father, this powerful session recounts the trauma endured by a young child at the hands of a perpetrator only to be cruelly treated by the legal system designed to protect her. Peyton's story led to the passage of the Child Witness Protection Act—a law now in place in Missouri which gives every child who testifies seven essential rights. Presenters: Brian Shelton and Victor Vieth, JD
